

# Turtle Escape:

-Liz Millar, Sound to Sea Instructor

Sound to Sea students and instructors as of late can be seen impersonating sea turtles as they crawl through a TED to escape the clutches of an otter trawl. What's a TED? What's an otter trawl? That's just what students are learning about at STS!

Otter trawls are popular commercial fishing devices often used to harvest shrimp. These trawls, however, are responsible for catching and killing a number of other marine species as bycatch. Bycatch are animals that are untargeted/unintentionally caught while fishing. Unfortunately, much of the discarded bycatch dies as a result of being caught; sea turtles are one of these animals.

As of 1987, the United States required all otter trawls to be equipped with a Turtle Exclusion Device (TED). If a sea turtle enters a modern-day trawl, it will encounter a metal grate that will prevent it from going all the way into the net. The shrimp will go through the metal grate while turtles can escape safely through the opening in the net.

The STS staff recently finished constructing a model TED set-up, allowing students to actually experience the ingenuity of its design as they crawl through the net.

# From the Executive Director:

Snow can be tricky for us to handle at Trinity Center. Of course snow can paralyze any community not prepared for it. Like many North Carolina counties, Carteret County doesn't see enough snow to dedicate much infrastructural support to managing a significant snowfall. If there is a significant snow event, road conditions can become treacherous fairly quickly here. And because Trinity Center is located on Bogue Banks just off the coast, we're in an even more precarious position. There are only two bridges onto and off of the island, and they arc high into the sky. Both of them can become almost impassable as they ice over, and the county will close the bridges if travel over them is deemed dangerous. At that point, Trinity Center can really seem like an island unto itself.

Several weeks ago we had just such a snow event on a Saturday. It was our third snow in four weeks, which meant that we were already in the middle of an abnormal weather pattern. The forecast was for Carteret County to get anywhere from a light dusting to a couple of inches. Instead, over the course of the entire day, we took about seven inches of snow on our 62-acre property. We had several groups on property, including three vestries from our own Episcopal Diocese of East Carolina churches.

At some point on Saturday afternoon, I stood around talking to the employees still present. Some of them were anxious about whether or not they could get home, as almost all of them had to go over one of the two bridges to make it home. At this point, we had been planning as if many of them might not be able to make it back in the morning, not knowing if the bridges would be open. The employees gathered represented several of our staffs – housekeeping, food services, maintenance, and POA (Point-of-Arrival). We decided what could be done to make our guests comfortable, we divided the tasks that needed to be performed in case employees could not make it over the bridge in the morning, and we began chasing tasks all over property. We worked together, we solved problems, and I believe that the guests on property were actually able to enjoy the beauty that the snowfall created around Trinity Center. It was a proud moment for me as executive director.
